Carl: It being on or after 7:00 on October 20, 2022, I'm going to open up the meeting of the Georgetown Conservation Commission.

And this meeting is being conducted in a way that is an attempt to satisfy the Open Meeting Law, and other State Laws pertaining to the Public Hearings of the Town's Public Bodies. It's a good faith, best effort to comply with the new law, Chapter 22 of the Acts of 2022, signed into law on February 15, 2022. On July 16, 2022, Governor Baker signed into law an Act relative to extending certain state of emergency accommodations, which, among other things, extends the expiration of the provisions pertaining to the Open Meeting Law to March 31, 2023. Specifically, this extension allows public bodies to continue holding meetings remotely without a quorum of the public body physically present at a meeting location, and to provide "adequate, alternative" access to remote meetings. The Act does not make any new changes to the Open Meeting Law other than extending the expiration date of the temporary provisions regarding remote meetings from July 15, 2022, to March 31, 2023.

We have some business items to discuss; a Certificate of Compliance, some meeting minutes, one new hearing, and some other hearings are being continued at the request of the applicant.

Replacement and installation of approximately 4,320 linear feet of underground gas main along East Main Street and National Avenue.

Present:

Theresa Portante of BSC Group on behalf of the applicant (Boston Gas Company)

Carl: Since it is after 7:00, I'm going to open up a new RDA. That's a public way

along East Main Street and National Avenue; GCC# 2022-13. That's the replacement and installation of approximately 4,320 linear feet of underground gas main along East Main Street and National Avenue. If I could have the applicant and/or consultant, and if you could identify yourself for the record,

please.

Theresa: Sure, my name is Theresa Portante, I'm with BSC Group. I'm here on behalf of

the Boston Gas Company.

Carl: Thank you. If you would like to present your case to us, and tell us what you're

going to do.

Theresa: Sure. As stated, the project involves both the replacement and installation of a

gas line currently located along East Main Street and National Avenue. All the work is going to be done within the existing roadway; it'll be within segments; it'll be within the 100-foot buffer zone to BVW, and the local 50' no-disturbance zone. But again, all of the work is going to be contained within the road; and the work itself, the replacement components, are exempt under the Bylaw as well as the Wetlands Protection Act. And the new gas line installations, again because they're all within the road, they're considered an exempt minor activity under the Wetlands Protection Act. The RDA that was filed is for a determination under the

Bylaw - if the components involve new installation within the roadway, a

determination under the Bylaw is required.

Carl: If I might ask - are we going to a larger gas main, or is the existing one corroded?

I'm just curious why we're replacing it.

Theresa: I don't have the detail as to if it's a condition, or if it's to re-route and provide

additional service to another area along this route.

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Carl: Is this something that they want to do right away, or is this something that they're

planning 6 months out?

Theresa: I don't have an exact time line, I'm sure that's going to be predicated on whether

they can do it, and then be able to repave within the timeline of the year.

Carl: Steve, do you have any further information on this as far as the activity? In a

sense, it's pretty straight forward.

Steve: It's utilities in the roadway. Historically, the Commission's concerns are where

the dirt gets stored, rain events, and preventing erosion.

Carl: Sure.

Steve: As long as measures are taken to prevent that, it's kind of a no-brainer to be

honest with you. It's just the erosion and the time; not doing work during rain

events, things like that.

Theresa: And certainly, BMP's (Best Management Practices) will be implemented as part

of the work that they will be doing.

Rachel: And just to ask, there's no National Heritage issue here?

There is no rare species; and if it was, all of the work is within a roadway, so it

would not be subject to MEPA.

Rachel: Okay. I just meant for where the dirt would be stored.

Theresa: Again, it wouldn't be outside of their work area. I'm looking on the mapping and

I'm not seeing any estimated or priority habitat within the area.

Rachel: Thank you.

Carl: Looking at this, there's almost ³/₄ of a mile of pipe. This looks like it would take a

while I'm assuming, in terms of duration. Not that it really changes the risk to the resource, it really doesn't – it just is a disruption to traffic and things like that.

I'm assuming it would take a while.

Theresa: It will require a permit with DOT to conduct the work, because it is within the

state highway, so that means they would have to get a traffic management plan

approved.

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Carl: Does anyone have any questions about the project?

*No one comes forward with questions.

Carl: Steve, are there any culverts that they need to go around or under or anything of

that nature, along this 3/4 mile section?

Steve: I think there's one, but they can go above or below it. I don't see any issues with

direct wetland impact or waterway impact.

Carl: Okay. So, there are no Commissioner comments? If none, I will open it up to

abutters, if there are any here to the project on East Main Street and National

Avenue.

*No one comes forward with any comments.

Carl: Hearing none. From my perspective, it's pretty straight forward work. I'm just

trying to better understand the duration and the overall impact of the project – but, it seems reasonable to me. And if there are no more comments or questions, I

would...

Rachel: I have a question, Carl.

Carl: Go ahead.

Rachel: Steve, even though they are exempt, they still would have to work with you if

anything came up, correct?

Steve: Correct. The exempt is under the state act, not under the local, so it's kind of a

given that they'll work with me.

Rachel: I just wanted that underlined and underscored. Thank you.

Carl: The state act pretty much exempts public utilities from lots of things, but the

Bylaw does have...we obviously allow the work, but they still have to do some level of coordination with us. So, I don't have any major heartburn with the project, and again I'll entertain a motion if someone would like to make one

regarding this RDA.

Rachel: Mr. Chairman, I'd like to make a motion for a negative determination for the

RDA involving the gas line on East Main Street, going to National Ave.

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Tom: Second, Howland.

Carl: There's a motion and it's been seconded to issue a negative determination for the

RDA along East Main Street and National Ave. Is there any further discussion?

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Carl: Is there anything else that we need to discuss? Any updates on any of the

enforcement things we have going on out there, Steve?

Steve: There was that one forestry cut one in Boxford...

Carl: Oh yeah, that was the Christmas tree one.

Steve: I don't know where that stands. I have to be honest; it's been a few weeks since I

reached out to them. They seemed like they were in a rush to get this going, but it's been going on all summer, into fall now. Until you mentioned enforcement, it was kind of off my radar, Carl. I'll check on that first thing Monday morning.

Carl: It's not a rush, I just like to keep track of these things. And the one down on Lake

Ave, too, just so we don't lose these things.

Steve: Exactly. I have to confess; I kind of spaced on that one, so I will get on that first

thing Monday and get back to the whole Commission on an update on where that

stands.

Carl: And I know that you've been out there posting some signs around our

Conservation areas, per my request, for what the rules are relating to hunting and things like that. I appreciate that, because we're in the season and as I said, I've seen it for the past few years in different locations - people just decide to use our properties for whatever they want to use them for, and you get ATV's or what

have you.

Steve: We also had an incident this month. Someone was camping at the community

gardens, and the police got involved. That was like a Saturday or Sunday I got

called in, so.

Carl: Yeah, why don't you give us a little more update on that? I don't know if anyone

else was aware. I was driving into work and I noticed someone tenting in our community gardens for multiple days. I called Steve and said that I don't think

we allow camping on the community gardens, and Steve went out and

investigated it.

Steve: The Board of Health got involved, and the police. The gentleman was just

passing through, looking for a free place to stay. I believe the police and the

Board of Health Director kind of on-site Googled free camp sites, and he's now in

Andover I believe.

Carl: Probably down at Harold Parker.

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Steve:

Yeah, it worked out. Speaking of Community Gardens, I've been there a few times in the past few weeks — we always talk about spending our down time in the winter, kind of strategizing how to improve things down there; I would say half of the garden plots, people are renting but doing nothing with them. And they're overgrown and disheveled, so I think we really maybe need to focus...Julie and I, since I've known Julie and we've been working together, we've been talking about doing that and it just never seems to happen.

Carl:

I know when Susan was working for the department, she wanted to take that on as like a project.

Steve:

Yeah.

Carl:

And I know at one point we tried to make some changes down there, and there were some people who were very upset; even though they didn't live in town they didn't want us to change anything down there.

Steve:

Yeah, so I'd say half the plots were not used and are just totally overgrown. And we have people interested, like a small waiting list. I just think we really need to maybe focus on it this winter and have some groups get together - maybe a subcommittee of gardeners so they're involved.

Carl:

We actually used to have somebody that was kind of spearheading that, and they were collecting the money and issuing the plots, etcetera. Again, it's a great community asset, and if people aren't utilizing them - just kind of hogging the lots and not growing anything, then we need to revisit that; especially if we have a waiting list.

Steve:

That was Lonnie Brennan, an ex-selectman that was kind of the gentleman who was the point person. Ever since he stopped doing that, we've had to take it over, and I'll be honest; it's not a priority. We manage it - mostly Julie in the spring, but it's a tough nut to crack. So, to your point, we welcome the assistance.

Carl:

It's interesting. I've seen a few articles in other communities about community gardens with inflation and things like that; people are sometimes trying to be a little more creative in how they're getting food, so they're looking for things like this to grow stuff to subsidize some of their own resources. It would be a good project for the winter.

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Steve: It's also very much underutilized in my opinion. We put a lot of money into that

new parking area, so we're putting some investments into making it better; I think we just have to work on the rules and regulations – but also enforcing the rules

and regulations, because they really haven't been enforced in 20 years.

Carl: That definitely sounds like something that we ought to take on, and maybe we

could also search for someone in the gardening community who's maybe willing

to step up and assist us in helping with that.

Steve: Also, a couple meetings ago we had someone in from the Rock Pond Association,

and we still follow up with Pentucket Pond regarding invasive species – so I think

that's also a good winter project.

Carl: Right, and we do have some funds available for that, I think.

Steve: Correct.

Carl: Alright, anything else? I know there were some upgrades down at Camp Denison

to the utilities down there, as I recall.

Steve: Correct, the electrical utilities.

Carl: And that's all complete at this point?

Steve: I'm actually not sure the status. I remember seeing the permits going through the

Building Department, but I don't know the status of the actual work – but I can

find out.

Carl: Yeah, or you could take a run down and see what's going on.

Steve: Yup. Also, we're coming into budget season – if you're interested in the budget

season and the process, let me know and I can incorporate you into the process. Typically, I take care of that through FinCom (Finance Committee) and through

the Selectboard, but again; I always open it up if any Commissioners are

interested or curious about the specifics, definitely let me know.

Carl: Yup. Rachel, when does the CPC window close for projects?

Rachel: November 30th.

Carl: So, I would ask everyone to think of something Conservation related that may be

beneficial to us, and let's see if we can't come up with a decent project.

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Rachel: The garden would fit, but you would have a very small window to do that for this

year. It would fit for next year, but I don't think you would have enough

turnaround time.

Steve: Got it.

Carl: Okay.

Rachel: Because you'd have to have it start to finish, unless it was maybe a study.

Carl: The project doesn't have to be completed; the project can extend a while I

understand.

Rachel: That's perfectly fine, yes; but you can't put together a whole project with bids and

engineer it, etc., and then have it ready to go and ask for a specific amount that you know you need in that amount of time – that's a very small amount of time.

Carl: Well, given the way government works, that's probably true. Alright, is there

anything else we need to discuss? Otherwise, we can adjourn and that makes a

pretty short meeting for everyone.

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CLOSING THE MEETING

Carl: If there's nothing else on the agenda, I'll entertain a motion to close the meeting;

one of the shortest I can recall.

Rachel: Second, Bancroft.
