Annual Report of the Finance and Advisory Board

To the Citizens of Georgetown,

The Georgetown Finance and Advisory Board is pleased to present you with its budget and warrant article recommendations for the Town, for the fiscal year 2009, beginning July 1, 2008 and ending June 30, 2009. Please note that the votes taken by the Board by the time of printing will be listed below each warrant article. Subsequent votes will be available at Town Meeting.

The Finance and Advisory Board is presenting Georgetown Residents with a balanced budget for FY09. After careful consideration and discussion, it is the Board's recommendation to put forth only one operating override which would include a "Strong" chief position for 30 hours per week and create a per diem system for firefighters. The Board along with the School Committee and Board of Selectmen, working together, felt that with today's current economic climate that a town-wide Proposition 2 ½ Override would not be the path to choose. Instead we looked at all of the budget requests and made some very hard decisions. Some budgets were funded at their FY08 allocations, some had modest increases and some, unfortunately we reduced below their FY08 allocations.

Other debt exclusion overrides for various departments have been reviewed and placed in the warrant and on the ballot for your consideration. Other Capital needs were requested but those discussions have been deferred until the Capital Improvement Planning Committee can put together a more detailed long range analysis of the needs of the Town.

Throughout the budget process, one theme was consistent; it will only keep getting more difficult to fund our Town budgets with a 91% residential tax base. Discussions are already underway for long range forecasting for both the operating budgets and for capital expenditures in addition to those committees looking to the economic growth of the town.

The Finance and Advisory Board would like to take this opportunity to thank all the Departments, Boards and Committees for all of their hard work in putting this budget together. The process itself was not only educational into the needs of the town, but allowed all involved to get to know their neighbor a little bit better.

A VOTER'S GUIDE TO TOWN MEETING

At Town Meeting, the voter's approve or disapprove moneys allocated to Town departments necessary for operation throughout the following fiscal year.

The Board of Selectmen, School, Highway, Police, and other departments are then bound by this allocation. If they expect to exceed this limit, then they must go back to the taxpayers at a Special Town Meeting and ask for more. It is a popular misconception that the Board of Selectmen or School Committee control the spending of your tax dollar. This is not true, they only get to spend what you allot to them at Town Meeting.

Other decisions are also reached at Town Meeting that affect your day to day living in Georgetown. All zoning by-laws and changes must be approved at Town Meeting as well as street acceptances, license fees and penalties, and requests for purchase of capital equipment.

Who's Who at Town Meeting:

The **Moderator** presides and regulates the proceedings, decides all questions of order, and makes public declaration of all votes.

The **Finance Committee's** primary duty is to advise and make recommendations to Town Meeting on the budget and other areas of finance. Statutorily, their authority is limited to making transfers from the town's reserve fund to other line items in the budget for extraordinary or unforeseen occurrences.

The **Town Clerk** keeps accurate records of the minutes of Town Meeting and records all votes passed as declared by the Moderator.

Town Counsel sees to it that the presented articles are in proper form and is available for consultation with the Moderator on legal questions during the meeting.

The **Board of Selectmen** (or Select board as is more politically correct) is a three person elected board that holds the responsibility of "day to day" operations of the Town. It is this board that sets the time and place for the Town Meeting and prepares and issues the Warrant.

The **Town Administrator** serves as the chief administrative officer and manages the Selectmen's office, prepares for Selectmen's meetings, coordinates with department heads, and is liaison with Town Counsel. At the present time the Town Administrator also serves as the Acting Finance Director.

The Order of Business:

- Meeting called to order
- Return of the Warrant
- Pledge of Allegiance
- Invocation
- Introduction of visitors
- Complimentary Resolutions (appreciation certificates, etc.)

- Reports of committees
- Consideration of the Warrant Articles
 - O What are commonly referred to as "stock items" are called early in the meeting and most often consist of:
 - o standard operating budgets, such as Light Department
 - o Road Machinery Fund continuation
 - o cable television revolving Account
 - O Articles then normally follow in numerical order an exception may be by a motion to amend that an article be "taken out of sequence." On occasion there may be circumstances that make this desirable or necessary. A majority of the voters present must be obtained to move the sequence of articles.

Procedure for Each Warrant Article:

- The Moderator will announce the article number.
- The Motion is made by the appropriate board or sponsor of the article.
- The Moderator may repeat the article.
- A "Second" is required to open the discussion.
- Report of Advisory Committees (usually Finance Committee and/or Planning Board).
- Explanation by appropriate board or petition sponsor.
- Discussion:
 - o Those who wish to speak must be recognized by the Moderator. Raising your hand should do it or you may proceed to any of the floor microphones to do so.
 - Once recognized, please state your name and address.
 - o Address all remarks to the Moderator and all questions through the Moderator.
 - O When the Moderator senses that the meeting is ready to vote, the motion will be repeated prior to the vote being taken.

When discussion has come to a close and the motion has been repeated for clarity, the Moderator will call for a vote.

Votes:

Voice vote: Most often this process begins with "All in Favor (raise the voting slips you received when checking in at the meeting)". If the voice vote (raise of voting slips) has obvious results, the Moderator will then state that the motion passed or failed.

Standing count/show of hands:

If the vote (raise of voting slips) seems too close to call by a voice vote (raise of voting slips), or the vote is immediately questioned by seven voters ("I question the vote"), the Moderator will ask the Tellers to come into the meeting and count the votes. Each Teller has a pre-specified area to count. The Moderator will ask those in favor of the motion to hold up their voting slips-they are counted and the results are tabulated and reported to the Moderator. The process is then repeated for those against the motion. The Moderator will then announce whether the motion has passed or failed and the vote tally.

Ballot vote: Voting by secret ballot is done if prior to a standing count, a motion is made and carried to count by written secret ballot. The Town Clerk then disburses specific ballot slips and they are collected in an orderly manner in a ballot box and counted. The results are given to the Moderator who will announce the results to the Town Meeting.

Once a vote is counted - by standing vote/show of hands or ballot vote - it cannot be questioned.

Vote Quantum (Proportion) Required:

Majority

- to pass an affirmative main motion (budget etc)
- to pass the acceptance of a road if it is part of a subdivision plan

2/3 required

- to amend zoning by-laws
- to appropriate from Stabilization fund
- to take or purchase land or easements(generally)
- to take or purchase land for a Public Domain
- to transfer Municipal land (not for park purposes) to another board or municipal purpose
- to sell or abandon land or easements acquired other than by purchase and held for specific purpose (schools, playgrounds...) in charge of a board or committee other than Selectmen
- to make changes or additions to a Town Map prepared or approved by planning board and adopted by town meeting
- road acceptance if NOT part of a subdivision plan

4/5 required

• to PAY UNPAID BILLS FROM THE PREVIOUS YEAR which may be unenforceable due to the insufficiency of an appropriation (at special town meeting 9/10)

Motions & Terminology

For those who have attended many Town Meetings, the "language" of the meeting may be sometimes somewhat confusing. Massachusetts General Laws and the Town of Georgetown By Laws are full of such terminology in "legalese." The following are some of the most often used motions and a listing of some basic terminology. These are written in, hopefully, an every day understandable language.

Terminology:

Appropriation

• An authorization by Town Meeting to make obligations and payments from the treasury for a specific purpose.

Assessed Valuation

• The value set on real or personal property by the Board of Assessors as a basis for setting the tax rate.

Capital Budget

• A multi year plan of spending for large capital items requested by Town Departments. Most of these are voted on individually as warrant articles.

Cherry Sheet

- Called so due to the cherry pink color paper on which it was originally printed.
- A form from the Massachusetts Department of Revenue showing all of the State and County charges and reimbursements to the Town as certified for the following year.
- Supposed to be received by March 1 of each year from the State Tax Commission.

Fiscal Year

• A 12 month period commencing on July 1 to which the annual town budget applies. The moneys appropriated at the May Town Meeting are for the next fiscal year starting July1.

Free Cash

- The amount of Surplus Revenue over and above uncollected taxes of prior years.
- Free Cash must be certified by the State Director of Accounts.

General Fund

• The major town fund created with town receipts and tax revenues from which the majority of town expenses are met.

Operating Budget

• A plan of proposed spending and the proposed means of paying for it for the next fiscal year.

Reserve Fund

- This fund is established by voters at Annual Town Meeting.
- To use these monies, transfers may be authorized by the Finance Committee and only for "extraordinary and unforeseen expenditures" that do not warrant calling of a Special Town Meeting.
- Any unexpended balance of this fund is closed out to Surplus Revenue at fiscal year end.

Stabilization Fund

- This fund is designed to accumulate amounts for capital and other future spending purposes.
- These moneys may be invested (and accrue interest) by the town.
- These moneys may be appropriated by a 2/3 vote at any Town Meeting for any legal purpose.

Surplus Revenue

• This fund represents the amount by which Cash, Accounts Receivable, and other assets exceed the town's liabilities and reserves.

Transfers

• The town may by majority at any Town Meeting, transfer any amount previously appropriated to any other use authorized by law.

Consent Calendar

The use of a Consent Calendar speeds the passage of warrant articles which the Selectmen and Moderator, in consultation with Town Counsel and the Finance and Advisory Committee, believe should generate no controversy and can be properly voted without debate.

Each year there are a number of warrant articles which past experience suggests that the action taken on the floor of the Town Meeting will be routine, non-controversial, and predictable.

At Town Meeting, said list is then read by the Moderator as "Articles 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, and 12". If any voter has any doubt about passing a motion, or wishes an explanation of any article included in the Consent Calendar, the voter will say "hold" in a loud voice as each article is called out.

The Moderator will then ask if the "hold" is for a question or debate. If it is for a question, an explanation will be given and the article remains on the Consent Calendar. If the "hold" is for debate on the article it is removed from the Consent Calendar and restored to its original place on the warrant to be brought up, debated, and voted in the usual manner.

After calling the individual articles on the Consent Calendar, the Moderator will ask that all articles be passed as a unit by a unanimous vote.

Article 6: Municipal Light Department Continuation of Operation (ATM08-06)

To see if the Town will appropriate receipts of the Municipal Light Department for the operation of said Department under the direction and control of the Municipal Light Board, as defined in Section 34, Chapter 164, General Laws, for the Fiscal Year beginning July 1, 2008, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 7: Zoning Board of Appeals Revolving Fund (ATM08-007)

To see if the Town will vote to continue the Zoning Board of Appeals Revolving Fund as authorized by Chapter 44, Section 53E 1/2 of Massachusetts General Laws. This fund shall be funded by applicants' fees to be expended without further appropriation for the purpose of application review including, but not limited to review services, clerical, legal expenses, equipment and office supplies. The Zoning Board of Appeals may expend from this account an amount not to exceed \$ 20,000 for the Fiscal Year beginning July 1, 2008; or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 8: Road Machinery Fund (ATM08-008)

To see if the Town will vote to continue the Road Machinery Fund as authorized by Chapter 44, Section 53E ½ of the Massachusetts General Laws. This fund shall be funded by payments for rental of Highway machinery and shall be expended without further appropriation for the purpose of purchasing highway equipment. The Highway Surveyor, with approval of the Board of Selectmen, may expend from this account an amount not to exceed \$25,000, or the balance in the account, whichever is lesser, for the Fiscal Year beginning July 1, 2008 or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 9: Conservation Commission Revolving Fund for Camp Denison (ATM08-009)

To see if the Town will vote to continue a Conservation Commission Revolving Fund for Camp Denison as authorized by Chapter 44, Section 53E 1/2 of Massachusetts General Laws. This fund shall be funded by program fees, facility use charges and outside vendor charges to be expended without further appropriation for the purpose of maintaining the support of the land and facilities including, but not limited to utilities, seasonal staff, legal expenses, equipment and office supplies. The Conservation Commission may expend from this account an amount not to exceed \$9,000 for the Fiscal Year beginning July 1, 2008; or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 10: Local Access Programming (ATM08-010)

To see if the Town will vote to continue a Cable Television Revolving Fund as authorized by Chapter 44, Section 53E 1/2 of Massachusetts General Laws. This fund shall be funded by the Annual License Fee and the PEG Capital Funding (Section 7.4 of the contract) paid by Comcast and Verizon to the Town to be expended without further appropriation for the purpose of Local Access Programming, including but not limited to, utilities, salaries, equipment, maintenance and office supplies. The Cable Advisory Committee, with the approval of the Board of Selectmen, may expend from this account an amount not to exceed \$80,000 for the Fiscal Year beginning July 1, 2008; or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 11: Chapter 90 Reimbursement, Transportation Bond (ATM08-011)

To see if the Town will appropriate the sum of \$222,538, or any other sum to be reimbursed by the Commonwealth of Massachusetts under the Transportation Bond issue, to be spent by the Highway Surveyor, with approval of the Board of Selectmen, under the provisions of Chapter 90 of the General Laws, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 12: Fire Department, Fire Alarm Revolving Fund (ATM08-012)

To see if the Town will vote to continue a Georgetown Fire Department Revolving Fund as authorized by Chapter 44, Section 53E 1/2 of the Massachusetts General Laws. This fund shall be funded by the annual fees charged for connection to the Municipal Fire Alarm system to be expended without further appropriation for the purpose of maintaining the Municipal Fire Alarm System. The Fire Department may expend from the account an amount not to exceed \$10,000 for the Fiscal Year beginning July 1, 2008; or take any other action in relation thereto.

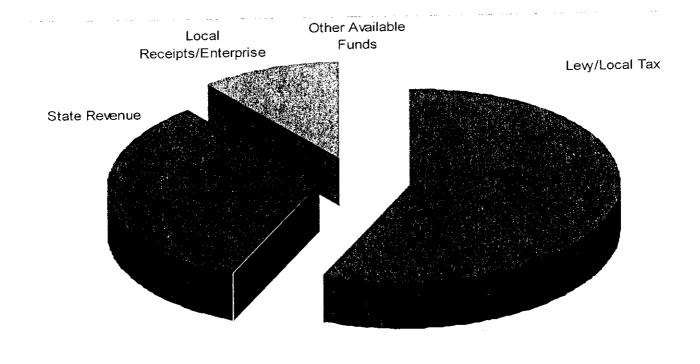

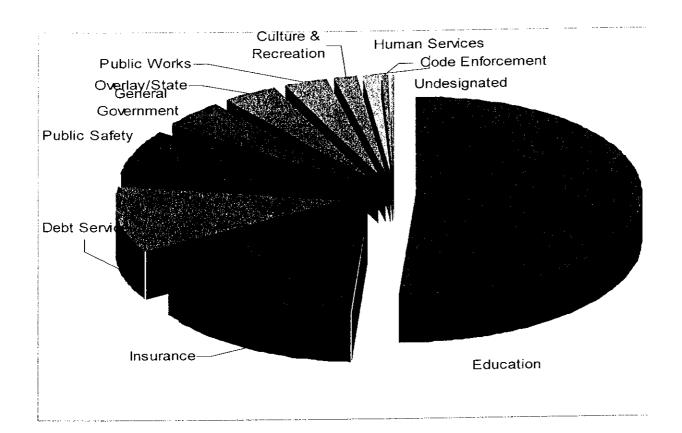

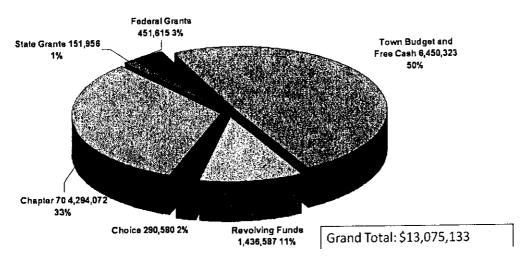
DEPARTMENTAL EXPENSES — FY 2009



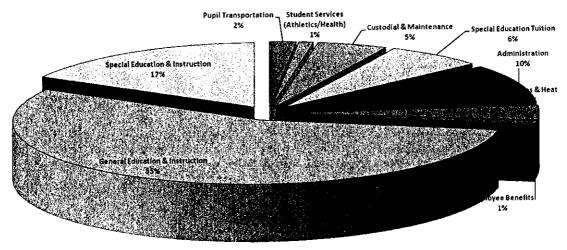

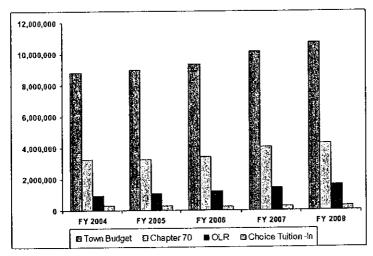
Revenue –where does the money come from?

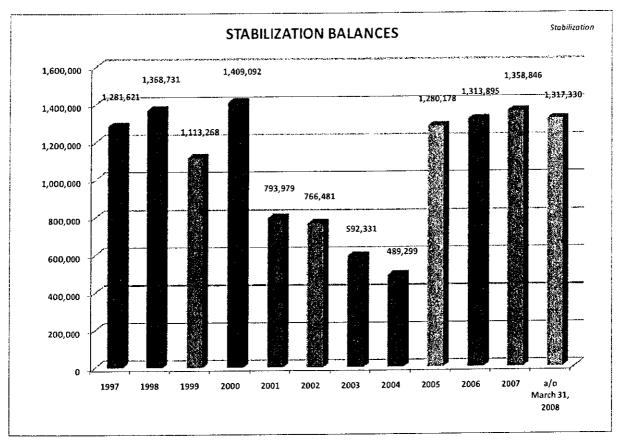


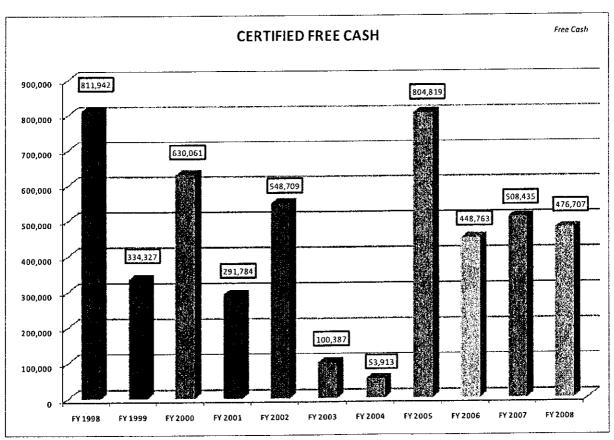
Where does the money go? FY08 Expenditures by Category

To see if the Town will vote to amend the vote taken under Article 3 of the 2007 Annual Town Meeting warrant for the purpose of adjusting line items in the FY07 budget, and, as necessary, to raise and appropriate or transfer and appropriate from available funds a sum of money for the purpose of supplementing departmental expenses, or take any other action relative thereto.

In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, you are hereby directed to notify and warn the inhabitants of the said Town, qualified to vote in the elections and in Town affairs, to meet at the Penn Brook School Gymnasium in said Town, on the 12th day of May, 2008 (Monday) to act on Article 1 of this warrant for which polls will be open from 8 o'clock A.M. until 8 o'clock P.M., and to meet at the Georgetown Middle/High School on the 5th day of May, 2008 (Monday) at 7 o'clock P.M. then and there to act on the remaining articles of this warrant:

Article 1: Annual Town Election (ATM08-01)

To vote by ballot for the following officers: one Selectman, one Assessor, two Library Trustees, one Light Commissioner, one Water Commissioner, and two School Committee members each for three years; one Planning Board Member and one member of the Georgetown Housing Authority each for five years, and to vote on the following questions:

Explanation:

This article proposes projects recommended by the Community Preservation Committee under the Community Preservation Act (CPA). The descriptions of the proposed projects/actions are contained below:

- Samuel Brocklebank Museum The Captain Samuel Brocklebank Museum, home of the Georgetown Historical Society, believed to have been built in the 1660's, displays Georgetown's early artifacts and furnishings. Early portions of the house represent one of the oldest structures in Georgetown today. The red cedar roof shingles have deteriorated over the years, and water damage is now staining and destroying the inside walls. The roof replacement is now required, in order to preserve the structure. Some of the exterior clapboards on the main house, as well as the attached ell need replacement, in addition to sealing and painting the building.
- Historic Resources Survey This item provides for the necessary funding for the research of historic properties, creating reports of theses properties and their inclusion in the MA Historical Commission Inventory. Identification, evaluation and protection of historic properties are the primary goals of the Historical Commission and the creation of the survey is the required first step in the preservation process. The inclusion of properties in the MA Historical Commission Inventory serves as the basis for National Register Nominations and the establishment of Historic Districts which are necessary to qualify for grants from the MA Historical Commission. The Georgetown Master Plan includes the creation of Historic Districts and the Historical Commission is seeking to comply with these recommendations.
- Harry Murch Park This item provides the funding for the construction activities required in the preliminary phase of site preparation for Harry Murch Park. For the purposes of this project, we define the preliminary construction phase as the removal of the existing bituminous walk, bench pads, benches and adjacent trees, the salvaging of the monuments and flagpole, raising the existing concrete cover in lawn, all aspects of grading including filling the site to an appropriate grade and stabilizing the site by establishing a lawn and installing an irrigation system. This item also provides funding to allow the Highway Department to move the Veterans' Monuments currently located at Harry Murch Park to the Veterans' Memorial Green at the intersection of Warren and Jackman Streets. This will allow for a secure location where the Veterans' Monuments can be appropriately and prominently displayed, since Harry Murch Park will be inaccessible during the site preparation phase of the construction sequence. The safe relocation of those Memorials, as well as additional steps necessary to provide for the preservation of the Memorials and the Veterans' Green are also provided for.
- Acquisition of Land for Development of Active Recreational Use This item proposes acquisition of
 two parcels of land and development thereof for active recreation purposes. The 2007 Master Plan for the
 Town of Georgetown identified the need for 40 acres of additional Active Recreational Lands that would
 be required to serve the town's existing and ever growing population. The acquisition of these proposed
 parcels is the first step towards satisfying that need.
- ADA Upgrades for Camp Denison Cabins The Camping Cabins at Camp Denison are not currently
 ADA accessible. This article will provide funding to allow the volunteers at the camp to make 4 of them
 comply with ADA standards.

• Creation of Recreational Path -

- o Mass Highway has formally notified the Georgetown Board of Selectmen of a \$960,000 commitment towards the preliminary (25%) design of the entire Border to Boston Multi-use trail from Salisbury to Danvers.
- o The bidding process for the preliminary (25%) design is currently in process and is expected to be awarded before the end of 2008.
- o The 25% preliminary design is expected to be completed by the end of 2009.

- Each town is responsible for acquiring the rights to the former RR right-of-way and must be formalized pending the results of the 25% design. (This work is underway as part of Phase II of the project)
- Should the project qualify for final design and construction with Federal funds, it is possible that Georgetown may be responsible for approximately 10% of the project costs.
- The current estimates for Georgetown based on the Fay, Spofford, and Thorndike Study are: Construction \$4.4; Final Design - \$330K; & Preliminary (25%) Design \$220K.
- O Therefore to be financially prepared for this obligation, \$250,000 is requested for a FY2009 appropriation. The obligation balance will be requested at the next town meeting for a FY2010 appropriation.
- The funds will be spent on satisfying the local match and outstanding acquisition expenses. If a local match is not required, funds will be placed back into the CPC account.
- Administrative Expenses The CPA authorizes the appropriation of up to 5% of the FY09 estimated annual revenues to be appropriated for the expenses of the Community Preservation Committee.
- Open Space Reserve The CPA requires that a minimum of 10% of FY09 estimated annual revenues be spent or set aside for Open Space purposes.
- Historic Resources Reserve The CPA requires that a minimum of 10% of FY09 estimated annual revenues be spent or set aside for Historic Resources purposes.
- Community Housing Reserve The CPA requires that a minimum of 10% of FY09 estimated annual revenues be spent or set aside for Community Housing purposes.

Article 28: Senior Citizen Tax Exemption (ATM08-014)

To see if the Town will vote pursuant to the provision of G.L. c.59, section 5, clause 41C to adjust the eligibility limits for exemptions granted under MGL Chapter 59 Section 5 Clause 41C by reducing the qualifying age from 70 to 65, and/or by increasing the "Whole Estate" limits from \$28,000 to \$40,000 if single, and from \$30,000 to \$55,000 if married, to be effective in the Fiscal Year commencing on July 1, 2008, or take any other action in relation thereto. The Finance and Advisory Board will make a recommendation on this article at Town Meeting. The Board of Selectmen recommends approval of this article. (Vote: 3-0)

Article 29: Senior Citizen Property Tax Abatement (ATM08-015)

To see if the Town will vote to increase the sum of money included in the overlay account from \$5,000 to \$10,000 for the purpose of providing Senior Citizen Property Tax Work-Off abatements for Fiscal Year 2009, which work-off abatement program was authorized by the Town's acceptance of G.L. c.59, §5K, thereby increasing the size of the program from 10 to 20 participants, or take any other action in relation thereto. The Finance and Advisory Board will make a recommendation on this article at Town Meeting. The Board of Selectmen recommends approval of this article. (Vote: 3-0)

Article 30: Fire Department Establish, "Strong Fire Chief" (ATM08-030)

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to request the General Court to not take action on and withdraw Senate Bill 2343 "An Act Providing for the Establishment of a Strong Fire Chief In the Town of Georgetown", and further that the Town accept G.L. c.48, §§42, 43, and 44, the so-called "Strong Fire Chief" statute, which establishes a fire department under the control of an officer to be known as the Chief of the Fire Department, or take any other action related thereto.

The Finance and Advisory Board will make a recommendation on this article at Town Meeting.
